RECOMMENDED CHANGES IN THE UNIVERSITY
FELLOWSHIP FOR MINORITY STUDENTS

A time limit should be established for length of support on this fellowship. The recommendation is for four years of support, usually three years before candidacy and one afterward, although if circumstances warrant, all four years of support might precede candidacy.

All students should be supported at \$375 a month plus tuition. This could be achieved by any type of packaging a department might arrange. If a student's level of support were to be less than \$375, this should be approved by the Associate Dean.

Programs and departments will be notified that University Fellowship funds are available to support approximately 25 Predoctoral and First Year fellows who are minority students. Therefore, departments are urged to nominate qualified minority students for these competitions. If, after regular competition, any of the Predoctoral or First Year awardees are minority students, University Fellowships will fund these. (If a Predoctoral is received, this could be over and above four years of University Fellowship support since this is a separate competition.) This would be implemented this year only if some additional funds become available. Otherwise, implementation would be delayed until next year.

For those few students whose programs require ten month or III-A funding, fellowship support would continue to be possible on an individual basis as in the past.

The name of the fellowship remains the same.
